## Jim's Weekly Rant:

I am back ranting about employment again as the main dairy season comes to an end and a new one is about to start. But it is the changes to the immigration system that is now placing pressure on the rural sector with the ridiculous changes to the process for employing immigrants. There is a massive shortage of good staff in the rural sector across all levels, that's from the very basic entry level employee through to farm managers. The entry-level staff are essential as they are the ones who learn the many necessary skills and progress through the system by being nurtured by the industry. The new system allows immigrant labour to enter the workforce at a Herd Managers level with 3-years of industry experience or a Bachelors Degree or equivalent. To start an immigrant at this level on a minimum of \$31.61 per hour compared with the minimum hourly rate for a New Zealand resident of \$23.15 per hour is a nonsense. Many immigrants have had the necessary three years of experience, but it has often been in specialist areas on factory type farms overseas or on small holdings where they farm less than 20 cows. And we have to offer them management- type positions to help top-up the employment pool. To employ an immigrant the employer must be an Accredited Employer and that process takes time and costs the employer money. There are 2 levels of Accredited Employers, with the most common being those with less than 5 employees and "tokens" are made available for each position on offer. The employees are screened and categorized via the ANZSCO system. The ANZSCO categorization identifies various skill levels being 1 to 6. Levels 1 to 3 are for management positions and above while level 4 to 6 are the labouring or entry level positions. The level 4 to 6 skill levels make it nearly impossible to employ and bring staff into the country to fill that very necessary farm assistant position. It is hard enough for the level 1 to 3. The skill levels 4 to 6 are where our entry level employees begin their careers and they are essential for the industry. I think we all understand the reasons to better control immigration, but the current changes are detrimental to agriculture and while the government has said they want to get NZ moving again and fast track some developments, they have stuffed the existing system up even further. Before the Accredited Employers accreditation was introduced the system worked OK, it is now a bureaucratic nightmare and the agricultural industry is being disadvantaged as a result of the changes. Federated Farmers has spoken out against the changes and I have voiced my frustrations to Immigration NZ, but we all need to do more because it is very difficult to find young New Zealand people who are wanting to go farming, and part of that is because previous regimes have promoted farmers in a negative light!!
